CJ 4116 PROGRAM & POLICY EVALUATION

This course examines methodologies for the formal assessment of social programs using quantitative and qualitative methods of inquiry including survey, interview, observation and case study techniques. The political and social processes framing evaluation research are also discussed. The course requires a student project to apply lessons learned.

Lecture notes and handouts will supplement text readings.

COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course uses a program evaluation focus to teach the application of research methods to practical problems. The course has three major components. Lectures, discussion, and your course text will impart necessary knowledge about program design and policy evaluation. In the lab, individual and group work assignments will involve you in applying fundamental technical skills such as asking research questions, structuring a case study, running focus groups, conducting data analysis, interpreting and writing up research findings, and making recommendations for future research.
